


#### **ZEAL MONACHORUM WI**

#### A PLANTSMAN IN ZEAL

Terry Jones came to Zeal in the summer of 1971. Born in Knutsford, Cheshire, he had been to school at Sedbergh, in Cumbria. There, running across the nearby Howgill Fells, he developed a lifelong interest in plants and birds. He began work before the war as Curator of Wildfowl at Longstock, where John Lewis [the founder of Waitrose] had a major collection. After war service—he hated the sea, but volunteered for the navy because he reckoned on seeing more wildlife—he returned to Longstock and helped lay out the Water Gardens, planting up some of it.

At 60 he was retiring, leaving an all-found residency at The Abbas for Hoggets, the double plot he purchased here in Zeal. With no pond planned, he decided instead to make a new breed of Bantam, Belgian Blues, which he always kept in houses beside his garage. A founder member of The Belgian Blue Society, these he exhibited at shows throughout the South West. Little and bye, he became well known as the village executioner, willingly wringing necks for those who were too squeamish to despatch their elderly hens.

His main hobby, however, was gardening. Just as he bred his own strain of bantams, so he pollinated his own hybrid plants. Those distinct enough from their parents, yet spectacular enough to warrant keeping, he named with the prefix 'Zeal'. The pale yellow Rhododendron pictured here is one such: Zeal Doubloon, it has a hose-in-hose flower, but the colouration from the single flower of its dominant parent.

His plot consists of mostly heavy clay. Some of the plants he wanted to grow required a free draining sandy soil; he made a terrace for them, spending time collecting buckets of local river grit, which was used to lighten and help drain an otherwise soggy patch of ground. The result was a place for Tulipa Sprengeri, the red tulip pictured below.

It's certainly been a year of change at Blueberry Hill!

2024 began with an expectation that the garden would be handed over to other people to run. This meant that a solution had to be found that would enable the business to continue whilst functioning more efficiently in terms of time and costs. So, unfortunately, after 17 years, the deliveries had to stop.

The upside is that the produce is now available on site for anyone who would like it. There is a lovely display of vegetables and seasonal fruits in the 'shelter' there. To ensure a good variety, there are items grown by Michael Thorne in North Tawton and Anthony Thorne in Stockleigh Pomeroy as well as produce from Blueberry Hill.

For anyone who does not know the garden, we are situated about half way along the road to Bow, on the right. There is a conspicuous sign! I am there most mornings, but so that people can use the self-service system at other times, I am giving out the gate code to those who would like it. If this is of interest to you, please just come to see me once during a morning so I can show you how it all works.

As for the garden itself, it's still productive. Runner beans are coming to an end, but there are cabbages, turnips, kale, carrots, tomatoes, grapes, apples and squashes. Soon to crop will be celery, leeks and chard, and we've sown winter crops too, such as spinach, pak choi and salads.

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
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#### **FISHING CLUB CHAT**

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#### ON THORNE FARM

August is the busiest time of the year for us. We have had over 100 calves in the last 3 weeks & we having been bringing cows back from their 2 month holiday at Thorne Farm ready to give birth. Between milking & feeding calves we are checking the stock out in fields & preparing sheds ready for winter accommodation

Harvest has been challenging due to the changeable weather. The last of our crops to take in is around 100 acres of maize, left to harvest in September/October. Just now hedges are being trimmed to encourage them to thicken & provide a habitat for a variety of wildlife.

#### **NOVEMBER GARDENING**



As November arrives, it's an important time for preparing your garden for Winter and planning for the Spring ahead. Take a look at these tips on what needs doing in the garden this November, courtesy of Bow Garden Centre;

- 1. Plant Tulip bulbs now, making sure they are covered with at least twice their depth of soil or bulb fibre.
- 2. Insulate your outdoor containers to protect from frost, using bubble wrap or fleece.
- 3. Plant Shrubs, Trees, and Fruit trees; before the ground becomes too cold & wet (Bow have an expanded range now in).
- 4. Prune Roses to prevent windrock/root damage by pruning them by one-third to half of their height.
- 5. Cut down perennials, allowing you to clear any weeds found, then mulch the surrounding soil with bark or Strulch [a proprietary mulch with slug repellant].
- 6. Cover empty vegetable beds with well-rotted organic matter during the colder months to improve soil nutrition.
- 7. Plant up a colourful display of Autumn/Winter bedding.
- 8. In case of increasing rainfall, raise containers onto pot feet to prevent waterlogging.
- 9. Keep on top of leaf raking and keeping your pond clear of all debris.
- 10. Continue to supply wildlife with food and shelter as they can struggle this time of year.

#### ZEAL MONACHORUM PARISH COUNCIL

Our latest meeting was held on 26th September. There were no apologies, all councillors were present along with representatives from the district and county council.

During the open forum questions were raised about wheelie bins being left out on the road/pavement all week. The Mid Devon councillor present confirmed that householders were obliged to remove the bins after collection.

Councillors were kept up to date with a meeting held in July with the Highways Officer, who now has charge of a staggering 36 parishes. Many potholes. He had explained that on the DCC website there was a link showing a map of all road problems reported to them, along with information on when repairs are likely to be undertaken, but the dates could be fluid!

During a discussion with our Mid Devon councillor the subject of heating allowance was raised. Those on pension credit will still receive the heating allowance. The council think there are many who are eligible for pension credit and are not claiming. If in doubt there is a phone number on the MDDC website that will help with the process of seeing if you are eligible, which needless to say is not straightforward.

The Clerk reported that the new Parish Council website was up and running. The councillors were pleased with the layout. In theory anyone who wishes to view P.C. minutes/agenda can see them on the website. The e address is:—

There was a report on the latest Denbrook meeting. Zeal Monachorum fishing club had put in a bid for a new hut. This was postponed to the next meeting as more information was required. Our allocation stands at £6,400.

Three planning applications were discussed and successfully resolved. The meeting closed at 8.15.pm. The next meeting will be held on 28th November at 7.00.pm.

## UPPER YEO AND TAW MDDC councillor's report September 2024

Mid Devon Leisure swimming pools are converting chlorine based indoor pools at Lords Meadow Leisure Centre and Exe Valley Leisure Centre to electrochlorination using salt. Using salt is cleaner, safer and offers a more soothing swim to enjoy. Salt chlorinated pools outperformed chlorine based pools in every aspect related to health, cleanliness, and body benefits. We are getting special pieces of equipment called a salt chlorine generator. Our leisure centres are now being run on 100% renewable electricity, boosted by the solar panels on site.

MDDC has started creating the Community Risk Register. This has a timeline and will be shared further with Towns/Parishes. The final version is due to be ready in April-May 2025. The provisions will be reviewed annually.

Winter Fuel Payment Government have changed the rules with regards to Winter Fuel payments—from now only people getting Pension Credit are eligible for the payment. Now the key factor is to apply for the Pension Credit if you have not done it earlier. It is believed that only 57% of those eligible have applied. Check your eligibility, you may be surprised! Pension Credit, as well as the Winter Fuel allowance, is not paid by MDDC but by DWP. However, MDDC is happy to assist filling forms for those not familiar with online applications. If you need a supported application over the phone or face to face. Call MDDC on 01884 255255. You can contact Chat, Navigate or CA as well. Please be sure you get everything you are eligible for!

Landline goes digital BT started consultations in our area about replacing landline with digital connection. The consequence of that may be a complete isolation in case of the main power cut, if you do not have good mobile connection. This can be quite serious issue for our remote rural areas. It is particularly dangerous for vulnerable people whose health depends on the ability to be in touch with emergency services. Some people have special vital treatment 24/7 and will need 100% guarantied power supply. In some cases a portable electricity generator may be a solution. Even if you have less critical special needs, like you are visually impaired and need big buttons on your telephone, you need to discuss it with your line provider as your old equipment may not be digital. So, if you have special needs, please contact BT or other providers before the changes come to your house. Alternatively, contact local Authorities, MDDC or your Parish Council, and ask for help. No one should be left unattended!

#### Village Hall AGM & Slide Show

Zeal Monachorum Village Hall was bought by the Community in 1956 and became a charity and a Trust. At the AGM on 18 November 7 for 7.30pm those who live in the Parish can nominate and elect the Trustees who sit on the Management Committee who are all volunteers. The Committee usually meets in the evening 6 times a year for about 1.5 hours. Unlike some committees, the work done mostly involves practical action which is appreciated by the community and consequently can feel very rewarding.

The applause at the end was enthusiastic and it was generally agreed that a 2nd Festival next year would be welcomed. The event raised over £260 for the Village Hall.
