'Yes' he said 'it would keep out the flies and insects'. I replied the cows and myself would soon suffocate! He said 'Don't be silly you can leave the doors open to let the air in!' Good old red tape and rules hey! All the best for 2025.

### ON THORNE FARM

We sadly failed our last TB test and are awaiting results from the next one. All the stock are housed & enjoying sanctuary from the weather—either in loose housing & bedded with straw—or the milking cows are in cubicles on a bedding of soft sawdust which is refreshed every day. Most of the calves are weaned: we have 30 still on milk twice a day, the older ones are eating a diet of a wheat pellets, hay & silage—whilst the milking cows are fed a ration of grass silage, maize (sweetcorn, but the whole plant as well as the grain), hay, rape seed & minerals.

We have a vet/nutritionist who comes every month to check the condition of our cows and they make any changes to the diet that may be needed. Most of them are now ready for breeding again—usually around 60 days after they have calved—Gallagher the Aberdeen Angus Bull is with the heifers at Thorne & we artificially inseminate the milking cows at Down St Mary.

Luckily we did not suffer any major damage from the first two named storms of the year; we are hoping for a favourable spring to help our winter wheat grow, although at least one field has failed due to the wet autumn.




### **FEBRUARY GARDEN ADVICE**

Start preparing your Spring garden with these essential gardening tips for February, courtesy of Bow Garden Centre;

- 1. Prepare vegetable beds, removing all weeds and forking in plenty of compost. Once finished, cover prepared soil with sheets of weed-control membrane to keep it weed-free, drier and warmer in preparation for Spring planting.
- 2. In raised beds, the soil warms up faster and water drains quickly, so they are ideal if you want to make an early start in the garden.
- 3. Start outdoor sowings of early crops.
- 4. Chit seed potatoes Bow have a wide range of potatoes available.
- 5. Plant out Summer bulbs if it's not too wet, with gravel and bulb fibre underneath to stop them rotting, or pot them up and put them in the greenhouse to give them a head start.
- 6. Pot up containers, hanging baskets and pots with spring bedding plants. Bow has a beautiful selection including, Violas, Pansies, and Primroses.
- 7. February is a great time to prune deciduous trees & shrubs before new growth begins. Don't forget to remove any damaged or dead branches to encourage healthy shoots.

- 9. Cut down ornamental grasses left standing over the winter, before fresh growth appears.
- 10. Continue to leave out plenty of food and water for the wild birds in your garden, particularly in cold weather conditions, where it's a good idea to check that there's plenty of food twice a day.

Who's Horace Graham Barber? some of you will be asking. Well, if we said he was the chap who had kept the ostriches at Serstone, some of you will immediately remember him.




At one time he owned The Arrow Restaurant at Bow, and operated a coal and fertiliser business from The Old Ambrosia Factory at Lapford. Eventually, moving with his family to Ellicombe, Morchard Road, he built the popular fishing lake there, installed the solar panels and let out several converted units to various businesses which are now managed by his widow, Margaret.

His daughter, Tracey, read a very moving and amusing tribute full of memories which the congregation laughed and cried through. Daughter Fiona, gave a reading entitled 'Your Spirit- a Tribute to my Father' and son, Ian read the poem 'Beyond the Rainbow's End'. Graham was obviously well thought of by the number of mourners who filled the chapel and stood outside in the winter sunshine. Afterwards, back at The Waie Inn people continued to reminisce, looking back through family photos and sharing memories of a truly remarkable man.

### MARTYN TUCKER

A sad time for all to remember and reminisce the memory of Martyn Tucker, who tragically died following the quad bike accident which took place on the B3220. Martyn, affectionately known as 'Windy Tucker', because of the controversial Den Brook Wind Turbines which cover some of his farm between Bow and North Tawton, was a well respected and popular farmer particularly known in country circles. He had kept and bred, or partly owned, several Point-to-Pointers over the years, the most famous being Fishy Story.

We were in a 1/3rd share partnership in a horse called Bob Along Mahler, which won a race at High Bickington back in May 2018 (see picture below). We have always known Martyn and his family just as we know the other injured passenger, Shirley, who I went to Sunday School with at Morchard Bishop. It was only a few days before the accident that we were all enjoying a delicious Christmas Dinner for EHSC at Burrington Village Hall. Martyn and I entered the Christmas jumper competitions, Shirley was selling raffle tickets and Hazel, Shirley's Mum came over to enquire after my Mum and my health following my slight facial stroke. I remember saying to Hazel, "you never know what's around the corner" and see what has happened!

Martyn leaves behind his 2 sons, Duncan and Colin, grandchildren and his 99 year old Mother whose birthday was New Year's Eve. Our thoughts and prayers are with you all at this sad time. If anything good has come out of this it is that some people have gone out and bought a helmet. Please wear it. You wouldn't ride a horse without a helmet.
