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MY LIFE IN THE NAAFI by Stephen Watkins

Part 6 - The final chapter of my NAAFI life.

After Christmas leave, I managed to meet with Bob Talboys about my pay. I was not prepared for the outcome of that conversation. I was informed that my pay was being backdated with a pay cut. Apparently, at that time assistants on capital ships, like the carriers and Fearless, were paid more than a junior manager on a small ship. Therefore, I was to be paid less as a manager than I would have been as an assistant on HMS Fearless. I was furious. I handed my 3 months' notice in there and then and busily got job hunting. Fortunately for me, my good friend and ex NAAFI colleague Tim Gibbs knew of a job for me and a place to live so everything was put in place for me to leave.

Unfortunately, when at sea and on our way back to Portsmouth during my notice period, HMS Cardiff was diverted and was at sea for longer than anticipated. When the captain realised I was no longer a NAAFI employee as my notice had expired, he had no choice but to get me off the ship. I packed all my belongings and said my goodbyes. A helicopter was sent out to pick me up and drop me off on the Isle of Lewis. I managed to get a helicopter to take me to Aberdeen airport where I hired a car and made the long journey back to Devon.

A few weeks later, I went to Portsmouth Dockyard to collect the rest of my belongings. It was a weekend, so nobody was around to say goodbye. As I drove out of the gates for the last time, it felt like a huge part of me had been left behind. I have no regrets about leaving, I have had a wonderful life with NAAFI and since, but I regret the way I left.

Since leaving, I have managed to get back in touch with a lot of old colleagues and have attended Royal Navy and NAAFI reunions. The bonds you form with people you share time with are priceless. One of my favourite experiences since leaving was being given the chance to represent NAAFI at the Cenotaph Remembrance Parade, an emotional and proud moment. The NCS will remain a huge part of me and the people will remain my friends for the rest of my life. NAAFI made me who I am today; I joined as a shy, introverted adolescent and left as a confident man with a unique skillset, work ethic, and a whole heap of amazing memories as well as the friends that come with them.





TAW VALLEY BREWERY New tap room at opening in July

Local micro-brewery Taw Valley Brewery will be opening its barn doors for visitors this July. The new brewery tap room seats 40 people and will give a chance to sample the ales brewed by hand on site. The brewery, which is believed to be the only fully thatched brewery operating today in the UK, will be open for the first three Saturdays in July from 3pm till 6pm.



Taw Valley Brewery started brewing during the summer of 2017 at Westacott Barton, by Nichols Nymet between North Tawton and Bow. Ale is brewed with crystal clear spring water from a medieval well, together with the finest local malted barley, generous helpings of hops and a passion for great tasting craft beer.

The brewery is in a c.17th century former threshing barn with views out towards Dartmoor. All brewery waste effluent is processed by a series of reed beds established on site located around a medieval quarry. Ale is brewed in a traditional way, often using a 'hopnic' technique to maximise the flavour of the hops. All the ale is vegan friendly.

Please let me know if you can make any suggestions who I might contact. Funding remains available for local projects from Denbrook Windfarm, we must use it or risk losing it.

Finally, thank you again to those who have slowed down in response to "20's plenty" and dog walkers, please continue to pick up the dog poo and dispose of it in the bins provided.

Annual Parish Meeting - Report of Parish Council Chairman

So much has changed in our lives since the last annual Parish meeting in 2019 as we have gone through the various stages of Covid. Zeal Monachorum has reacted in such a positive way and a new village spirit has been born. Help has been offered to the most vulnerable with shopping etc. and new friendships have been formed. We have met and chatted as we "exercised" around the village and, last summer, Covid safe street parties were organised to celebrate Victory in Europe (VE day). Good weather and lockdown brought out the flags and bunting as tea (and other drinks) were consumed to the sound of 1940's music.

The Parish Council has paid for a new notice board made at short notice by David Bowyer which has helped with communication. A Zeal Monachorum group was set up on Facebook and very many villagers are keeping in touch this way. Monachorum Matters, our excellent newsletter, continued to be published during the lockdowns.

Sally Rowden is thanked and congratulated for being the driving force behind the book swap and sincere thanks to Eleanor Wilson for so generously allowing her garage to be used. I think these books did no end of good in helping our sanity.

I would like to thank those who shopped for people like my wife and I who were advised to stay put. So, a huge thank you to the helpers and I hope that when we get back to normality we can have a massive village party to meet up again and keep the new found "bon ami" going. If anyone has any ideas how to achieve this please let any Councillor know.

Finally our thanks go to the Waie Inn. As a village business they have been hit hard by covid, but during the lockdowns Karen, Sue and other members of the family have provided takeaways which have proved to be invaluable.

The Parish Council has met when necessary by the use of Zoom; this has been a very new experience for many and a fast learning curve but all Councillors have mastered the art. There have been fewer planning applications but one of the more significant was the approval of 5 new homes on the site of the chicken units on the eastern edge of the village. The Council supported the application as it felt it was a better solution than converting the existing unsightly buildings and would help to provide more new life to the village.

Funding is still very much available from Denbrook Community Fund with grants in excess of £10,000 available so please bring forward any ideas for projects. So far, the largest amount for this parish has gone into the new football field near Burston with smaller amounts towards Monachorum Matters.

During the last year the Council considered purchasing the telephone box by the church. It is a listed building and in poor condition, so it was decided not to do so. Adjacent to the telephone box is a stone obelisk which was erected to celebrate the provision of a water supply to the village. The lettering has faded, and dirt and grime have built up over the years. It is within the conservation area and listed so guidance has been received from MDDC on how to clean it. This planned work was to be carried out by Councillors but was put on hold during lockdown. The Council will now re-consider whether it is still appropriate to carry out the work ourselves or employ a specialist which will be very much more costly.

The canopy to the Jubilee Seat is also in poor condition. It has been made secure but major work is required. It had been hoped that a local solution was possible, but the nature and scale of the work means that quotes will now be needed from specialist tradesmen; I will update further in the village newsletter.

Monachorum Matters

The newsletter in its current form is now into its third year of production. The last twelve months have been a challenge with the loss of several advertisers, some of whom had to close for business during the Covid lockdowns. This naturally had an impact on the income which is so vital to our survival. However, thanks to financial support from the Parish Council and grants totalling £1740.00 from Devon County Council and the Denbrook Community Fund, our finances are in a relatively

healthy state. The grants have given us a buffer to ride out the period of reduced income while we seek out new advertisers and we are beginning to pick up new businesses to replace those who have not renewed.

We continue to be well supported by the community in respect of articles, stories and pictures and it feels very much a community led publication with nearly half of each monthly issue being filled by items from regular contributors. We continue to meet our goal of having no more than half of the pages covered with advertising. It is gratifying that we are still receiving positive feedback from readers. The Editorial team is largely unchanged since we started and comprises:

Womens' Institute

The report from President Jan Brealy began with a look back to the formation of Zeal WI in 1954, when 24 ladies were present. Early meetings were held in the Church Room (now a car park), but since February 1955 all home meetings have been held in our Village Hall.

Over the years a range of entertainments have been put on by the WI ladies, including shows, plays and sketches and occasionally larger WI meetings of the Red Earth group have taken place in our hall. The number of members has fluctuated over the years and, after the Covid restrictions, there are 19 existing and 3 new members eagerly looking forward to meeting again.

Church warden's report to the Annual Parish Meeting

I don't think any of us could have begun to imagine just how 2020 was going to unfold and the impact the pandemic was going to have on every one's lives. The 2020 Annual Parochial Church Meeting was much delayed until October and was then held on Zoom. Dr Michael and Mrs Susan Bostock stood down from the PCC and the Worship Group, a thank you presentation was made to them. I was elected as church warden and Mr Tony Brealy, Mr Tim Herniman, Mr Gavin Rowden and Mrs Becky Harvey were re-elected to serve on the PCC.

The 2021 Annual Parochial meeting was held in April, reverting to its usual time of year. Gavin and Tim both stood down but I am happy to report than Mr Colin Crothers has been elected to the PCC.

The pandemic has prevented any fundraising events or any fellowship after worship and this has affected our income. Our thanks go to the Parish Council who provided grant aid for the upkeep of the churchyard.

Our PCC is currently receiving quotes to do long overdue and much needed work on the Church, which we hope will be done shortly. The work of resurfacing the paths around the Church has taken up much time both at, and outside, PCC meetings and is a major expense which we are currently looking into funding.

In February the Rev. Robert Gordon accepted the post of an Associate priest (Team Vicar Designate) in the emerging minster hub. He will be licensed on July 14 at St Andrews, Colebrooke. Robert's experience of Devon was reported in a recent issue of the newsletter but it is fair to say he has much experience of Devon and the Devonshire countryside. We look forward to welcoming him to our church and his ministry for us.

As a small rural parish we struggle at times to meet the demands made both physically and spiritually but we trust that we can look forward to a renewal of our church life, placing us in a strong position within our mission community. The future of churches within our deanery will change significantly with the emerging Crediton Minster Hub aiming to pioneer a different approach to rural ministry. Rev. Robert will still have responsibility for our mission community working independently, but coming together with the hub when it makes sense to do so, in particular through school work, administration, lay development and social action.

We are very fortunate to have volunteers to act as sides men, readers, cleaners, flower arrangers and grass cutters, giving generously of their time as well as donating money to guarantee the future of our church.

CLIMATE EMERGENCY - SAVE THE PLANET WASTING FOOD - BREAD

By throwing away food, we are not only wasting the actual produce but also the resources and energy within it. Wasting food feeds climate change. Food systems consume about 30% of available global energy and, out of this, 38% is utilised to produce food that is either lost or wasted (UN Food & Agriculture Organisation). UK households are throwing away eight per cent of a £65.31 average weekly shop every week – equating to £271.44 of edible food every year. Top of the list of the most wasted foods is bread. According to the charity WRAP [Circular Economy & Resource Efficiency Experts], the UK wastes around 20 million slices every day. Bread has been a vital foodstuff for thousands of years. These days it feels as if we no longer place much value on it. The trouble is I feel virtuous when I throw unwanted bread into the food waste recycling bin because it will be recycled, but that's got to stop, recycling must be the very last resort. Now I intend to change my bad habit by:

- freezing it, before it goes mouldy, as slices or crumbs;
- cutting down on buying bread not adding it to the shopping basket automatically;
- using what's in the freezer first;
- making meals with it.

My favourite is savoury bread and butter bake - just a few cheap ingredients and minimal effort but very tasty: Take about 4-6 slices of buttered bread cut into quarters, beat 1 egg into 250ml/½ pint milk, dip bread in milk/egg mix and line the bottom of a greased ovenproof dish. Add grated cheese and put another layer of dipped bread on top, keep layering cheese and bread, finishing with grated cheese; pour any remaining milk/egg over the top and leave to soak in for about ½ hour. Bake at 190C gas 5 for about 25 minutes until nicely browned and slightly risen. As an alternative to cheese, spread marmite on all but the top slices of bread and add sunflower, pumpkin or sesame seeds between the layers and on the top [photo shows the marmite and seed version].

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JULY GARDEN ADVICE

July is a wonderful time to spend time pottering in your garden into the evening, having friends and family over for BBQs and enjoying your flourishing flowerbeds. Make the most of the good weather, and take a look at these tips on what needs doing in the garden this month, courtesy of Bow Garden Centre:

- 1. Make sure all tall plants and climbers are well supported in case of wind or rain. Continue to tie in and train new growth on climbing plants.
- 2. Keep on top of watering, but avoid sunny times of the day. Early morning and late evening watering are recommended to reduce evaporation. Add mulch around plants to retain moisture.
- 3. Continue deadheading bedding plants and repeat-flowering perennials, like roses, to ensure continuous flowering throughout the season.
- 4. Summertime means that everything will be growing extremely fast. Mow your lawn once a week to keep it in good health.
- 5. Water any trees, shrubs and perennials that you planted in spring. Keep the base well-watered and avoid wetting the leaves as they don't absorb water well, and can encourage fungal diseases.
- 6. Keep your garden abuzz with wildlife by ensuring bird feeders are topped up and bird baths are full, as birds in particular relish gardeners' efforts, using bird baths to both hydrate and cool down.
- 7. Harvest vegetables and fruit regularly as this will encourage the plants to produce more and more.
- 8. Dahlias will be growing well to produce more flowers, cut the first bloom to a very short stem (avoid cutting into the flower buds below.)
- 9. Clear algae and blanket weed from ponds and keep them topped up, as water levels lessen through evaporation.
