## PARISH COUNCIL

May's event started with the annual Parish meeting. During the open forum it was noted that there was a disappointing attendance. It was suggested that in future more effective advertising may be helpful. The Church Council report outlined the ongoing improvements to the church and its surrounds. We were told that attendance had been marginally up from last year. There is a Hymns and Pimms gathering in the church on 30th June at 6.30. pm.

A report was read out detailing the year's business from Monachorum Matters. Jan Summers explained that after 5 years as editor, she now wished to stand down. A hard act to follow, but there are undoubtedly suitable people within the parish. The meeting requested that the Chair should pass on their thanks for all the hard work and enthusiasm that the editor had provided in the past years.

A report from the Village Hall committee outlined many successful events that had been carried out in the past year and listed improvements to the hall. It is clear that future necessary improvements are going to require further capital commitments.

The Clerk relayed the annual Parish Council accounts explaining that expenses had outstripped income due to the cost of the jubilee seat canopy and the ensuing repairs to the church wall.

This concluded the Annual Parish meeting and was followed by the annual PC meeting. The Chair agreed to stand for another year and was re-elected. Ken Hogg stated that he wished to stand down as vice chair, we thanked him for all his hard work sorting the many issues arising within the village. Peter Heal agreed to stand as vice chair, and this was unanimously approved by the council. The report concluded with a tribute to the late Ken Down, he is sorely missed. Then followed the ordinary PC meeting.

The Chair confirmed that Andy Richardson had put his name forward to act as a road warden and is now on MDDC's waiting list for the suitable course. Alex White attended, representing the District Council. The Chair pointed out that two parishioners had reported that construction work was being carried out without the relevant permission. Alex asked for the grid references and agreed to look into the issue. It was suggested that last year's meeting with the Highways Officer had been beneficial. Perhaps he would agree to a regular meeting.

Following numerous issues concerning privacy with PC members' email addresses on the village website, the meeting was informed that the PC had been removed; we now need to establish our own website. After discussion, a number of alternatives were offered to the Clerk for consideration.

Under planning considerations, it was reported that members of the council had carried out a site visit at Monks View where developers were applying for planning permission to alter the agreed plans concerning the surrounds. Councillors present voted unanimously to recommend refusal of the planning. Mid Devon Planning subsequently turned down the planning request.

The next meeting will be held on 25th July at 7..00pm.



### July Garden Advice from Bow Garden Centre

### July is a wonderful time to sit back and enjoy your flourishing garden, whilst making summer memories with friends and family over a BBQ. Take a look at what needs doing in the garden this month, courtesy of Bow Garden Centre.

- 1. Make time for regular weeding so weeds won't have time to set seed.
- 2. Help to retain water with water retaining crystals, and add mulch around plants.
- 3. Continue deadheading bedding plants and repeat-flowering perennials, like roses, to ensure continuous flowering throughout the season.
- 4. Summertime means that everything will be growing extremely fast. As a result, mow your lawn once a week to keep it in good health.
- 5. For a second bloom, cut back early Summer perennials, such as hardy geraniums and delphinium.
- 6. Keep your garden abuzz with wildlife by ensuring bird feeders are topped up, ponds and bird baths are full, as birds in particular relish gardeners' efforts, using these to both hydrate and cool down.
- 7. Start sowing biennials, such as foxgloves, forget-me-nots and wallflowers, for beautiful blooms next year.
- 8. Dahlias will be growing well to produce more flowers, cut the first bloom to a very short stem (avoid cutting into the flower buds below.)
- 9. Cover two thirds of your pond with pond plants to help prevent & build up of algae.
- 10. Now is a great time to get planting some Autumn bulbs in pots & borders including, nerines, colchicums & sternbergia.
