OUR NEW VILLAGE SIGN

As a newly appointed parish councillor I suggested a new village sign, the third such to stand near St Peter's southern gate. The first had been made and painted by the late Norman Vickery and was very popular in the community; it also won a prize for village signs in Devon. He also made the frame for its successor, but wind and weather got the better of it and had to be taken down. To make a third one again in wood proved too costly. Some of us in the village had used Hand Crafted Steel of North Tawton for fencing. So we approached the proprietor, Mr David Chesney, to see if a frame and mount could be done in metal; he gave a very competitive quote for powder coated steel; all that was needed was the artwork.

We already had Mike Russell's picture for the old sign of the late Nick Tyler, a well-respected churchwarden and, with some tonal changes, this was approved for re-use. Ace Signs of Exeter were asked to make it, as they have a completely modern process which, we are told, will not fade. All was ready on the 20th March. Pictured below are Mr Chesney, left, and his assistant, extreme right, with myself, unwrapping our new sign.

He went to his dog and it had been hit so hard by a vehicle that it was in desperate pain and died shortly after. NO VEHICLE STOPPED. This is a dreadful loss and will affect the working of the farm until a replacement is trained up.

Driving sensibly matters to us all. It is not many months since Mike Russell's dog was killed in Western Road by a speeding car. I stress to drivers using these lanes, 20 mph is too fast, especially around blind corners. The Fishing Club has put up signs in the hope that this helps. It is now time that Mid Devon Council also put some warning signs up. The fear is for me that the next time it will be a child, a cyclist or a dog walker.



FARMING NEWS

For those in the village who may not know us, we are Will, Jo and Nick Jones, who together with our staff Chris, Josh and Lauren, run a dairy farm, based at Down St Mary, with land spread over Zeal and Bow.

We run a 260 cow dairy herd with 110 younger cattle. Our milk is sold to the Arla Dairy Co-op, with our milk going to North Tawton to be made into cheese - they have a great shop onsite which we highly recommend if you want to buy local produce. Our cows calve from late August until January and from the day they calve, they milk for approximately 10 months before having a 2 month break, before they calf and the cycle starts again.

Throughout the year, each season brings its own challenges and jobs on the farm that need doing. The main challenges for us are: growing enough grass to feed the cows during the spring and summer months and also growing enough maize (sweetcorn) and grass silage to conserve and store to feed them over the winter.

As we write this in late April, we have had a very good spring. Our cows went out to graze in mid-March and the younger cattle went out a week or two later at Ken and Margaret Down's farm. All have settled into their routine well and we check all the stock daily for any signs of illness.

During May, we have been spreading muck and ploughing fields ready to till maize which is our most important winter forage. This requires warm weather to heat the soil and enough rainfall for the seed to germinate.

May also brings the start of silage making, which involves cutting the grass & turning it to dry it out, before chopping it into trailers with a harvester and then transporting to the winter store. These tasks take place alongside the job of milking the cows, which needs to be done twice a day, 7 days a week. It takes around 3 hours a session by the time we have cleaned all the equipment after milking. We usually start around 5 am & 3:30pm.

Unfortunately we suffered a break in last month and lost some power tools, so would remind you all to stay vigilant for unusual vehicles in the area acting suspiciously—rural crime is sadly on the increase.

We look forward to bringing you more news in future issues and if you have any specific questions, do please send them to the editor who will pass them onto us.

GARDENING NOTES

Mist in May and Heat in June Bring all things into tune



Hi to all gardeners

June is a lovely month and you should be kept busy keeping your garden free from weeds. Midsummer Day is June 24 and an opportunity to celebrate all that is good in the garden.

Gaps in beds need to be filled with long-flowering bedding plants such as cosmos or osteospermum. Tree ferns need to be sprayed with water, particularly on the crowns, to stop them drying out in the summer heat.

Dead heading is the key to keeping your plants flowering longer. Roses enjoy a nice cup of tea on these hot days; just the tea leaves though, as they appreciate the tannic acid.

If you don't have resident hedgehogs then you may have a problem with slugs and snails. Try crushing up 5 cloves of garlic in warm water, leave to cool and strain into a spray bottle. This can then be used on and around your hostas etc.

Don't forget to keep fresh water available for the birds to drink and bathe in.

It is important to keep a watchful eye on your potatoes and sunflowers for the village show in August. Continue mounding up the soil in the bucket as the potato shoots appear and regularly water and feed your sunflowers to keep the soil moist, but not soggy.

Gardening is enjoyable so let's hope the weather is kind enough this month to let us stand back and appreciate all our hard work.



NORTH TAWTON BOWLING CLUB

Have you ever thought about trying the game of bowls? This is a very enjoyable sport played in the open air during the summer months and indoors, on mats, during the winter months. It is not particularly strenuous but gives the player fairly gentle exercise through walking the length of the green during the game. For those who know nothing about the game this is how it works...

Lawn bowls is played on a bowling green on which are set out a number of 'rinks' roughly 5 metres wide by up to 40 metres long. The 'jack', slightly smaller than a tennis ball, is the target. The object is to get your bowls or 'woods' as close to the 'jack' as possible, thereby scoring points. Games comprise a number of 'ends' and in each one players roll their woods towards the jack, alternating turns between each team. When all the woods have been delivered the team with the most woods nearest to the jack wins the end and starts the next one. As for any sport, a level of skill is required, both in finding the right line to follow, as well as the right amount of propulsion (weight) in delivering the wood. Apart from the sheer pleasure of being outside on a summer day, this is a very sociable sport and matches, both league and friendlies, are usually followed by tea or a drink at the bar. Why not give it a try?
