



TONY BREALY REMEMBERS...

...this story of a family tragedy.

Just before Christmas 1924, Bryan John Dufty of Great Foldhay Farm planned a visit to relatives in Coldridge. He left the farm by wagonette with his wife,18-month old son, and his mother and father. They headed up the lane to Foldhay Cross (this lane no longer exists) and proceeded towards Zeal Monachorum. When they were going down the slope at the back of Gillhouse Farm Bryan applied the brake which startled the unbroken pony and it bolted. Bryan's father, in an attempt to halt the pony, jumped onto its back, fell off and broke his leg. The pony continued galloping and was finally brought to a standstill at the lane leading to Elm Cott, which is now known as a footpath to East Foldhay.

When Bryan gave evidence at the inquest, held at Great Foldhay, he stated he had seen his wife leave the wagonette and his mother and baby had also managed to get out. His mother was injured but the baby was all right. His father was being helped along the road by two men. Further back, he saw his wife lying in the road; she was unconscious with injuries to her head. She was taken to back to their farm, where she sadly died.

Dr. H.R. Bastard from Bow, on examination, attributed death to concussion of the brain and shock. The wife and her son, who died in his teenage years, are buried in the cemetery at Higher Chapel, Bow (this Chapel is just before the Bow Medical Practice turning).



With warmer, longer days and borders bursting with colour and activity, June is a great time for enjoying your garden.

- 1. Mow your lawn at least once a week but consider leaving an area uncut for wildlife. Plus feed your lawn regularly and re-seed larger areas, using an easy spreader for an even spread.
- 2. Plant up hanging baskets, make sure you use water retaining granules and a slow-release feed to help them flourish all summer. Fill any empty containers you have with new summer bedding.
- 3. Pinch out your tomatoes regularly, harvest any lettuce, radish and early potatoes and any other salads that are ready. Feed with Big Tom or Westland Boost.
- 4. Get summer ready and make any major changes to your garden such as new patios, garden buildings, and furniture.
- 5. Water plants early mornings and late evenings, when the sun is down, and install a water butt to collect rainwater and re-use for watering.
- 6. Cut back spring-flowering perennials, to encourage fresh foliage.
- 7. Start to pick Sweet Peas as soon as they flower and dead-head repeat-flowering roses to encourage more blooms.
- 8. Remove any dead foliage from spring flowering bulbs, with the exception of Daffodils and Tulips which could be left a little longer, but do take off any seed-heads that may appear. If possible, it is best to allow the foliage to naturally die back.
- 9. Keep the greenhouse well-ventilated during the day as temperature fluctuations caused by hot temperatures in the day, then cool at night could very well affect tomato plants fruiting.
- 10. Stay on top of weeding so your plants don't have to compete for water and nutrients.
