MARCH GARDEN ADVICE

For the lighter, brighter days of Spring. Top tips courtesy of Bow Garden Centre.



- 1. Once the weather has warmed, it's a great time to mix in a soil improver to your soil & mulch around the top to help boost plant growth for the coming year.
- 2. Beware of overnight frost and be sure to protect any tender plants with fleece or by taking them into the greenhouse.
- 3. Keep on top of pruning climbing plants and tidying up Winter shrubs such as Sambucus, Buddleia, Hydrangea or Fuchsias.
- 4. Prune Rose bushes from mid-March, making sure any dying or diseased stems are removed as well as shoots which have become damaged. Fertilise soil well with organic compost and rose feed to their base.
- 5. The first lawn trims, lawn feeding and lawn weeding should start in March, during dry weather to encourage healthy lawn growth through the year. Top tip—Leave a patch of lawn to grow & sow in wild flowers for a mini meadow area that the wildlife will love!
- 6. Bare patches in your lawn can attract weeds so re-seed now, and regularly water to repair these patches and prevent any new weeds from becoming a problem for your lawn.
- 7. Continue deadheading Spring flowers and any remaining Winter bedding so they don't set seed.
- 8. Once the soil starts to warm up again, you start to plant early varieties of seed potatoes, shallots and onion sets in your vegetable garden. Later Seed potatoes require a little more chitting.
- 9. Prepare your vegetable garden—Dig compost or well-rotted manure into your vegetable beds to prepare for the growing season ahead.
- 10. Protect new bulb shoots from insects and slugs with our pest control range including, natural and organic products.

PARISH COUNCIL

Notes on the PC meeting held, 22nd January 2025:-

After reviewing the minutes of the last meeting, a delegation addressed the council on the subject of the Monachorum Matters mode of operation. They requested that the PC should not donate funds to the magazine until their 'structure' had been overhauled. A lively debate ensued. The Chair pointed out that the previous editor had, two years ago, requested a similar donation from the PC whilst working under the same 'structure' and enquired why this issue was not raised at that time. The council had already made the decision to support the magazine's shortfall at a recent minuted meeting and will do so out under section 137 monies. At that meeting a condition was agreed that any further payments should be subject to a review. This gives plenty of time to hold a constructive discussion on the workings of the magazine. I think the magazine committee's plans are already underway to agree a constitution.

We are still working on the possibility of having a Road Warden for the village, particularly to supervise safety outside the village hall. If anyone is interested in giving up some time it would be greatly appreciated by the parish. It does involve attending a course run by DCC. You must have a certificate!

January is the month for setting our precept request to MDDC. The Parish Council routine expenses are budgeted to rise in the coming year. In addition we have been warned that should the amalgamation of the councils take place, more charges for services will be made directly to Parish Councils. As an example the cost of holding an election—and we really do need one—is now a few hundred pounds , that will become a few thousand pounds. A precept increase of 16% was unanimously agreed by the council. This represents an increase of 16p a week for a band D property on the council tax bill.

The meeting closed at 8.20 p.m. The next meeting will be held on March27th at 7.00pm. Rob Peck , Chair.

MEMORIES FROM ISOBEL HARRIS

Reverend Bernard Gales came to this parish, with his wife Susan, in1981. He was a widow who married the school headmistress of Morchard Bishop Church of England School. I witnessed the wedding from the choir stalls of St. Mary's Church when I sang in the choir. Bernard and Susan lived at Bow Rectory and Bernard became responsible for the parishes of Bow, Colebrooke and Zeal Monachorum. We were fortunate that Susan not only taught but was extremely musical and formed a small church choir here in St. Peters. Sadly the choir dwindled when The Waie Inn opened its doors and the draw of waitressing there was too much for some members to resist! Bernard and Susan retired to live at Morchard Bishop and was replaced by Reverend John Hall in 1993. Sadly Bernard died last year well in his 90s. He had a great sense of humour and would give a smile when Jeffery and Andrew Harris brought along their copy of 'Not Now Bernard' to read through the sermons at the family services!

It was a fitting tribute to both Bernard and Susan that a small choir was formed at St. Peters back in December, when we played host to the parishes in the west mission community of the North Creedy Team for the 5th Sunday service. Lay reader, Robert Vere, brought along the Cross from St. Marys, Morchard Bishop and I managed to squeeze into the red choir robe which was presented to me 40 years ago by the Zeal Monachorum PCC and led the procession of clergy from the belfry to the choir stalls. It is hoped a choir will come together at future 5th Sundays, when the opportunity arises.

NOTES FROM WOOTTON TOP

And so to February and we start looking forward to spring. We are preparing for the lambing season, getting all the energy licks, minerals and vitamins needed to help the ewe whilst heavily pregnant with the lambs. Preparing all the pens and fodder needed for the next month or so, we do hope the weather will improve and the lambs will be able to skip and jump in the spring grass and sunshine!

A few of you have asked what is different in the grass on your footpath walks; we have top sewn the fields with a lot of old fashioned herbs and legumes (see photo) such as plantain, sheep's parsley, burnet, trefoil, red and white clovers, yarrow and fenugreek. The idea is to help with natural parasite control and also help with resisting droughts and long spells of wet(that could be useful!), because of their different root systems and flowering different times of the year.

January seems to have been spent pulling vehicles out of the ditch on the Hayne road, 9 in one day is the record but quite often 2 is normal, I notified the council a while back and a lorry arrived to put cones up to show danger but when he turned to go home...you guessed it, the lorry slipped in the ditch and I ended up pulling him out as well and I didn't even get the cones! 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Upper Yeo & Taw MDDC

Councillor's report. January 2025

The Community Risk Register: I have informed you earlier that the community risk assessment was done by MDDC and the Community Risk Register was created after consultations with the District and Parish Councillors/Clerks. It set out the Resilience Strategy. This will help MDDC to better understand, monitor and potentially mitigate the highest risks within Mid Devon area. This master list and individual top 10 risks will be reviewed annually to ensure that MDDC are agile and up to date. The assessment was done using an impact/likelihood matrix, where the *Impact* (from 1 to 5) reflects the seriousness of the event, how many people and neighbourhoods will be affected and the danger involved; the *Likelihood* (from 1 to 5) reflexes the probability of events. Respectively, the most dangerous and most likely events may score a maximum of 10 points.

The master list is still open for more information, which must be sent to the responsible officer Lewis Dyson together with the scoring impact/likelihood assessment.

Mr Dyson recently came up with the suggestion that in the event of changing landlines to digital connections, areas of some Wards may suffer from the lack of a satellite signal. There are concerns with regards to the support for vulnerable people and an awareness of these within the emergency response environment. Mr Dyson suggested that although we have no power or ability to impact the decisions of the service providers, we could develop a tool to provide support for our communities. He would like to see if you are aware of "not spots" and could share details with him.


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MINUTES OF NEWSLETTER COMMITTEE MEETING 3rd February 2025 At Monkscroft 7pm.

Present: Ken Hogg, Mike Russell, Jane Hogg, Maria Richardson, Tony Brealy, Ali Birch-White, Ruth Friend

The minutes of the meeting held on 30th October 2024 were read, agreed and signed by Ken Hogg.

- 1 Ken welcomed Ruth and also Jane, who has agreed to take minutes at the meetings
- 2 **Finance**. Maria gave a summary of the financial situation:-

Cash at bank January 2024 £1,455.44 Cash at bank January 2025 £1,389.44

Maria has explained that for the sake of £4.25 bank charges, it would be better to stay with Lloyds. Ken stated that the Council has agreed to fund the magazine under section 137 of the Parish Council Act. The Committee agreed that monies be given to finance officer and secretary for incidental expenses such as ink and paper when necessary. Changing to a lighter paper has meant a saving of £45 per month, which has brought the deficit down to just over £150 given current advertising and printing expenses.

- 3. **Content.** Maria has to make sure she has all email address when she is informed of a new advertiser. The committee agreed we need more diversity of stories to reflect our community properly. Tony Brealy has agreed to write some witty stories.
- 4. Admin. It was agreed by the committee that the existing no fliers policy as agreed under Jan Summers shall be continued. Maria asked why the Church had priority in the magazine and Mike explained that the magazine is a continuation of the original Church broadsheet. He acknowledged the difficulty of the Churchwarden having to assemble service rotas, adding that as Churches are a cornerstone of village communities it therefore takes priority. Mike read the constitution to the committee members for approval and it was agreed by all and will be signed by Mike, Ken and Maria.
- 5. **AOB**. Maria asked Mike if he was happy to continue as editor and he replied he will carry on regardless as long as his health permits. Ken wanted to thank Jan Summers for all her good work she had done in the past for the newsletter. Ken asked Ali if she would be happy to fund raise for the newsletter, maybe a quiz night in the next couple of months and she agreed. Tony commented that whatever goes on the village Zeal always manages to raise money.

The meeting ended 8pm.



MAGAZINE CONSTITUTION

The name of the newsletter shall be Monachorum Matters. Its aim shall be to promote community activities carried on by local businesses, councils, village groups, the Church and residents. The objective shall be a monthly magazine, distributed free or made available to households within the Parish, with all costs met by donations, local groups and advertisers.

To further these aims and objectives there shall be a committee consisting of a Chair, an Editor, a Finance Officer, a Secretary and up to four other persons resident in the parish of Zeal Monachorum. On resignation of an existing Member, the Committee shall have the power to co-opt any resident willing to be a Committee Member. To maintain commitment to all the community, no Committee member may be seconded onto the Committee by any other local group to represent that group. The Committee shall have the power to:

- 1. Obtain, collect and receive monies by way of contributions, donations, grants and any other lawful method towards the aims of the newsletter;
- 2 Make payments for goods and services received insofar as they relate to the newsletter;
- 3. Do all such lawful things that further the aims of the newsletter.

The Committee shall meet at least four times a year, with at least four members present to be quorate. A proper record of all meetings shall be kept. Monies from donors, advertisers, other contributors and bequests shall be paid into an account operated by the Finance Officer; all monies drawn must be countersigned by two Committee members and funds in the account shall only be applied to further the aims of Monachorum Matters.

The duties of some Committee members shall be:

The Chair will preside over meetings and where necessary have a casting vote. They shall be responsible for signing off the minutes.

The Finance Officer will manage the Committee's account. They will at least annually present a statement of income and expenditure to the Committee.

The Editor shall accept submissions from all the community. As wide a range of activities as space and finance allows shall be published and this shall consist of farming news, forthcoming events in the parish and activities of village groups. Also covered shall be reports arising from the above, as well as articles submitted by local start-up ventures and residents' stories. The Editor shall determine the allocation of space given each submission without prejudice but may, at their discretion, give priority to the Church. All submissions published shall have been scrutinised and passed by the Editor; no fliers or other inserted copy will be accepted for distribution with the magazine. The submission policy is as follows:

All articles submitted shall be apolitical and uncontroversial; all photographic copyright shall be assured by the submitter; copyright of stories submitted for publication is the responsibility of the submitter. Submissions must be received by close of business on the deadline day in place at the time. Submissions may not:

- A. contain any defamatory or libellous statement about individuals or organizations;
- B. contain obscene, offensive, inflammatory or hateful statements;
- C. promote any form of discrimination, or threatening or abusive behaviour;
- D. promote any illegal activity;
- E. infringe copyright, electronic data rights or trade marks;
- F. promote viewpoints deemed contrary to the aims of the Committee.

The Editor may, at their discretion, edit submissions to fit allocated space, or refer them to other Committee members for consent to publish; such referrals will inevitably defer publication dates and neither the Committee nor the Editor shall be accountable for that delay. Editorial decisions shall be final; in cases of a refusal, the submitter may be informed of the reason for refusal.

The Newsletter may be wound up and dissolved by a two-thirds majority of the Committee serving at the time of dissolution. If confirmed, all bills must first be paid, then advertisers reimbursed pro rata for outstanding months and the Magazine computer donated to a nearby primary school once wiped of Magazine data. All amounts left in the bank account shall be donated to charities agreed by the Committee.



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
