



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LOVING MEMORIES OF BARBARA SKINNER Family Life in Zeal Monachorum

Barbara was determined, adventurous and kind. She appreciated life and had the ability to live in the moment. She grew up in Dudley with her three siblings, and was known as Barb Hayward. Her mother worked as a seamstress and her father as a welder. They lived in a small home where she shared a bed with her sister Val and had limited material things, but had much care and love. Her father would sometimes take them all on fishing trips, using his motorbike and sidecar, to find lovely riverside stretches in the Ironbridge area of Shropshire. Barb would watch birds and dragonflies by the river and grew a strong love of the natural world.

She met her good friend Diana at a jazz club in her late teens. They were well up on all the latest fashion, and Barb would make them new outfits for the weekend. She was the first in the area to wear a miniskirt - her younger brother wondered what it was! Barb and Diana hitchhiked on trips to see live music and to visit family. They saw the Beatles perform live and many others.

Barbara moved to London in her early 20s, she was open minded and learnt a lot. She worked hard and enjoyed trying her hand at new roles: for a clothes designer, in an office helping people on benefits, and she also worked for a family-run jewellers. After the hubbub of London life, Barbara moved to Margate in Kent and ran her own B&B business. She always enjoyed meeting people and liked helping them to have a positive experience with good memories.



During the off-season winter months Barbara worked at an accountancy training firm where she met Chris. He was strong-minded and always made her laugh, and she loved that. When he was unexpectedly offered a job in Devon they decided to move so that they could raise their children surrounded by nature and a close community.

Barbara and Chris Skinner moved to Devon in 1982, with Mark (2-years old) and Estelle (2-months). They bought a home in Barnstaple where they lived for a few years with Barbara's father. They later rented at Water Lane in Bow for a few months and, after searching for a place to really settle long-term, they moved to Zeal Monachorum in August 1987. They have lived in Zeal as a family ever since.

While the children were at Bow Primary School, Barbara sometimes helped out as a classroom assistant, and would bring in home-made artworks to tell stories and bring topics to life. She had planned to open her own nursery not long before she developed rheumatoid arthritis at age 36, but rather than dwell on what was not to be she moved forward and found positive solutions to bring out the best from life in true Barbara style.

Barbara was a warm and social person. She joined in village life, making good friends through school and also the WI. She enjoyed local events like the Zeal harvest festival, summer fete and open gardens, and also valued trips with friends including to the ballet in Plymouth. Tina, Erica and Jackie remained good friends into her later life.

Barbara set up her own business in 1988 - Country Bridal Collection. She converted her garage and used it as a bridal display area, so that she could run the business from home. The business brought her a lot of joy because she was able to help many brides to find their dream dress and to feel good in themselves in the run up to their big day. Barbara organised local fashion shows, including at the Waie Inn, to show some of the lovely bridal and bridesmaid dresses. These were happy and fun events, and many local people joined in.

Barbara had to pass on her business eventually due to her physical health, and she was sad to let it go. She didn't dwell on negatives though and she appreciated each day she had with family and good friends. She recognised how precious life is because she had almost lost hers when the children were very young and so to have the opportunity to live and see her children mature was something even more special to her.

The Skinners have always been a close family. Mark chose not to fledge and built his own home adjoined to his Mum and Dad's. Estelle has lived in Zeal periodically during her 20s and 30s, and loves to spend time at the family home, and walking or jogging the countryside footpaths.

Barbara and Estelle were part of the Bow Garden Club during the late 2000s. They joined in the garden visits, talks and the Christmas meal. They also enjoyed taking part in the Bow Twinning Quiz, where an incredible Indian meal was created by local people. The Skinners took part with their neighbour and good friend Stella, using team name 'The Zealots', referencing Zeal.

The family ran a special service for Barbara themselves at the crematorium in Exeter, on Tuesday 31st August. This was directly followed by Barbara's wake at the Waie Inn, which was a celebration of Barbara's positivity, with cheerful sunflowers and rudbeckias, and lovely photo montages capturing a life of fun, adventure and love.

Her ashes will stay with her family at their loving family home in Zeal. Her warmth and positivity will remain with us and can remind us to keep on valuing and loving life and those around us, each day and always.


For those joining our Bingo nights, please note that, as a safety measure, there will be no tables so please bring a board or book to rest your bingo cards on.

ZEAL MONACHORUM SHOPS

Shopping as a leisure and pleasure activity is comparatively new. In the past, in Zeal Monachorum, it would have been all about buying essentials for everyday life, especially for the poor and working class. The last shop in Zeal closed in 2002. I have found references to quite a few shops over the last 200 years, often remembered with much affection. It's likely that there were other shops than those described in the written records. In the 1840s, when my research begins, these might include: dry goods like oatmeal, peas, flour, salt; bread; treacle; bacon; washing soda; string; candles and lamp oil. While many people grew some vegetables for themselves and kept a few hens for eggs, not everyone had land to do that and so potatoes, cabbage and dairy products would have to be purchased; in the case of the latter, often direct from the dairy, close to where the cows were milked and where the cream, butter and cheese were made. There was a dairy at Glebe on Eastern Road for many years.

For the working classes, the only form of transport until well into the 20th century would be Shanks's pony and while, indeed, people could walk to markets at Crediton, North Tawton and further afield, that would generally only be on special occasions, such as the annual hiring fairs in the autumn. For working people and women at home looking after children, sparing a day and having enough money to spend to go to market in another town would be a rarity.

The first written mention I have been able to find of shops in Zeal is in 1841 on the Tithe Apportionment listing properties on the Tithe Map. William Mitchell had a shop in the area now known as Silver Park, near Waie Cross, on land owned by George Snell of Gill House. The Golden Lion Pub was on the same patch and by 1851 William Mitchell was its victualler and a machine maker. He died in 1867.

Also in 1841 Charity Slee, whose husband Richard had died in 1830; and her son, Richard, ran a shop at Withy Park in a row of cottages now known as Oldlands and Honeysuckle Cottage on Western Road. Richard was described in the census as a "writing clerk". I would think this would be a useful skill, and customers might well have been asking him for help with reading letters or documents, as few ordinary people had much education. By 1851 Charity was 72 and the census described her as "formerly shopkeeper". Another son, Thomas Slee, then aged 45, was the shopkeeper. However, Charity died in 1854 and perhaps the shop didn't make ends meet because, by the 1861 census, Thomas was a widowed lodger working as an agricultural labourer and he died in 1864. Another possibility is that, by 1850, Ann Vanstone, aged 53,was running a shop nearby and perhaps the competition was too much for the Slees. In 1861 Ann had her baby grandson, Mark Castle, staying with her. She died in 1863.

The Castles lived in the village for generations, with the craft of carpentry being passed down from father to son. Marriage was common between other long-time families in the village. Ann's link to the Castles may mean that the shop which, in 1861, Mary Ann Castle née Ellis, 1802-1874, was running, is the same one as Ann Vanstone's. Disappointingly, the whereabouts of shops in the village is not always clear; though, in this case, for at least some of the time, it is clear that the Castles did have a shop in Sacristan Cottage*, abutting the graveyard.

For the next 40 years or so, members of the Castle family ran a shop. The many changes make it feel as if sometimes it's all hands to the pump. The women shopkeepers included Ann Castle and Mrs Elizabeth Castle, née Clotworthy. There was also a continuing thread of shopkeepers, or the relatives of shopkeepers, being carpenters: John 1802-1863; Thomas 1807-1871; Joseph 1809-1868; his son Thomas 1846-1918 and the latter's sons Albyn 1880-1958, Clifford 1882-1961, and Zeal Joseph 1884-1938. Both Thomases also held the office of sexton [person who looks after a church and its graveyard and may act as a gravedigger and bell-ringer] and Sacristan Cottage would have gone with the role. The carpentry skills for making coffins would be essential to the role of sexton in a small parish.

Thomas, born in 1846, became sexton and undertaker and shopkeeper in the 1870s and continued into the 20th century. Sadly, by 1911 he was a patient whose infirmity is "lunatic" at the Devon County Council Lunatic Asylum in Exminster [a huge and grim place to end up in], and he died there in 1918.

I haven't found records of other Castles as shopkeepers or sextons after Thomas, although his sons continued to work as carpenters in Zeal.


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Prepare your garden for the cooler weather this October with Garden Advice from Bow Garden Centre


DUCK RACING


Charmaine's lovely Mum, Margaret, used to be our other Postie; she retired in May after 25 years.
