Anyone wishing to fish on a day ticket will have to call before fishing, as members will have booked on certain days. There has been another incident with people fishing the lake illegally at night: not paying, not safe socially distancing and leaving rubbish about the lake, in fact breaking every rule in the book. We have reported to Dave Waring, the village Police Officer, who is working with the Environment Agency to see what steps can be taken with the offenders. We have had to install cameras at the lake. This is quite upsetting as the lake is for the villagers to enjoy, not just anglers. We have appointed Mr Pete Henshaw as one of our Water Bailiffs and our Security Officer. He will be checking up on fishing licences and day tickets, and also observing general correct usage of the area.

This is quite a sad note for all of us who use the lake correctly and it must be upsetting for Rupert Dodge, our other Water Bailiff who, with his boys, carried out all the good work during lockdown. We would ask villagers who attend the lake regularly to please keep us informed if they see anything suspicious. (Call 07749 329832). We would also like to thank Tina Bowyer for her vigilance in the evenings.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish Council achieved a first on 3rd August when a Zoom meeting was held. Remarkably it went quite smoothly, although clearly face to face meetings are preferred.

The meeting was held primarily to approve some payments and consider three planning applications. The first related to a replacement thatched roof to a property in the conservation area. The Council had no comments to make. Secondly, consideration was given to an application for a 2 storey extension known as 1-2 The Elms. A letter was read out from a member of the public and considered by the Council. It was agreed to support the application but asked that access along the adjoining footpath should be maintained at all times during the works. It was also felt UPVC windows were inappropriate in a conservation area. Finally it was agreed to support an extension to an Agricultural workshop at Lower Reeve.

Concern has been expressed to Councillors as to whether the footpath near Hayne Bridge has been incorrectly moved. The County has inspected and believes it runs in accordance with the path shown on the definitive map. The Council has asked for a meeting to help clarify this.

A site meeting has just been held to consider an application for the erection of 5 dwellings on the site of the chicken houses at Butts Farm. The Council will have a Zoom meeting on the 17th August to consider the application. We will have dealt with the matter by the time you read this, but if we do continue to use Zoom, members of the public can join the meeting via Zoom as well.

OIL CLUB

Our Oil Club was set up about 7 years ago and since then a number of residents have come and gone from the village. As I haven't promoted it for quite a while it's probably time to let people know that it is running and explain how it works.

In simple terms we buy heating oil as a group; roughly every two months (monthly during the winter) I co-ordinate members' oil needs and then contact suppliers to find the best price I can. We always use local suppliers and by making bulk purchases we are able to secure lower prices than those who buy as an individual. For example, most tanks will usually hold about 1200 litres but the price per litre drops for 2000 litres or more.

Typical savings in recent months have been between 3p and 6p per litre, which doesn't sound very much until you calculate that on 500 litres the saving would be $\pounds 15 - \pounds 30$. Over the course of a year that adds up to a considerable sum.

The advantages of joining the club are:

- You pay less for your heating oil than if you buy as an individual.
- The minimum order is 500 litres but everyone gets the same low price regardless of how much you order.
- Buying regularly through the club means you can spread the cost of your oil throughout the year.
- You buy exactly what you need when you need it.
- There is no membership fee.
- By grouping purchases together the number of oil tanker visits to the village is reduced which is better for our environment.

CLIMATE CATASTROPHE SAVING THE PLANET - DRIVING

Many people used their cars less during lockdown and probably noticed the savings in fuel, maintenance and maybe even in insurance. I noticed fewer cars on the road when I did occasionally venture out which meant less reversing, a big bonus! Air felt cleaner, the bird song clearer, wild flowers more profuse.

Transport coughs out about a quarter of the UK's greenhouse gas emissions. It's also a major source of air pollution – linked to 36,000 early deaths a year in the UK. Cars and driving make up about a sixth of the total carbon footprint of the average UK person, according to Mike Berners-Lee. About half of that comes out of the exhaust pipe; roughly a fifth comes from digging up the oil and getting it to the petrol pump; and about a third from making the car in the first place.

A large car emits on average 85% more greenhouse gases per km than a small vehicle, according to figures from the UK Government. A decade ago SUVs made up 17% of global yearly car sales, but now account for 39%. According to the International Energy Agency, this demand for larger cars was the second largest contributor to the increase in global CO2 emissions between 2010 and 2018.

Could our personal actions help reduce that? Maybe one person will make little difference, but lots of us following their good example create a critical mass and can lead to a positive tipping point. Many people enjoy driving and are proud of their skills. Check out which of the following tips you're already doing and add the others to your repertoire.

- Driving at 50 mph uses 25% less fuel than 70 mph, all cars operate most efficiently at a speed between 50 and 60mph
- Accelerating and braking gently reduces both fuel use and pollution from tyre residues
- Use high gears, such as fifth and sixth gears, sooner than later
- Drop the revs It's more efficient to move up a gear at 2,500 revs (petrol) and 2,000 revs (diesel)
- Look after your tyres well maintained tyres are essential for safe and economical driving
- Check tyre pressures the correct pressure will improve fuel consumption by up to 2% [might not sound much but over time it's a financial saving as well as an environmental one]
- Don't leave the engine idling according to the UK Government, every minute a car engine idles produces enough exhaust emissions to fill 150 balloons with harmful chemicals, including cyanide, NOx and PM2. And it's not just people outside the car but those inside are affected too. Apparently many drivers who leave the engine idling do so out of habit.

Changing cars? Investigate the efficiency of different models, consider:

- A smaller vehicle
- An electric car. You can get a discount on the price of brand new lowemission vehicles through a grant the government gives to vehicle dealerships and manufacturers. You do not need to do anything if you want to buy one of these vehicles - the dealer will include the value of the grant in the vehicle's price. The maximum grant for cars is £3,000.

Finally use the car less:

- Plan ahead and combine trips
- Ask others to buy things for you rather than making a special journey
- Share the car, offer/accept lifts

Bear in mind short trips and cold starts double air pollution. Modern vehicles can emit twice as much pollution in the first five minutes of running. Frequent short trips increase wear and tear in an engine (whether petrol or diesel). It also increases the fuel consumption of your vehicle, as it does take the engine some time to reach optimum temperature.
