EDITORIAL

WATER OBELISK

No doubt many of you have noticed how clean and bright the obelisk near the telephone box now is. Our thanks go to several parties - to David Bowyer for his sterling work cleaning and re-painting the lettering, the Parish Council for deciding the restoration work should be done and facilitating it, and to Sally Rowden and Jan Brealy who removed the weeds which had grown at the base of the obelisk and planted something more attractive.

The obelisk commemorates the establishment of a clean water supply in the village, and its story was first told in our March 2020 issue. The inscription, which can now be seen clearly for the first time in years, reads: 'This water supply was the Victorian Jubilee gift of Richard Davy Esq. of Burston, to this village in 1887'.

Richard Davy was a surgeon at Westminster hospital in London and he had long been concerned at the quality of village water, most of which came from wells, and its impact upon the health of our residents. He gave £300 towards the estimated £500 cost of providing an improved supply. Equivalent values today are £40,500 and £67,500 - so he was a very generous benefactor.

We are sorry we can't yet give you a date for our fishing competition, but we need a clear spell of weather before we announce it. Tight lines.







PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Council held its most recent meeting on Thursday 29 July. A copy of the minutes of the previous meeting held in May has been on display on the notice board since the 29 July. In future, all minutes approved by the Council will be displayed immediately after the meeting.

The meeting welcomed Peter Heal, the recently elected District Councillor. Peter will be providing an update on his work in this magazine as well as attending the PCC. These updates are appreciated. The meeting was also attended by Ali Birchwhite who has kindly agreed to be co-opted as a Councillor. Her presence on the council is most welcome.

My thanks go again to David Bowyer for cleaning the obelisk by the phone box. It is now sparkling and the inscription can be clearly read. (See story on Page 2)

BT has painted the phone box, but the Council still feels there is no particular reason for them to take it over. As a listed structure it brings its own set of problems.

A planning application for an extension at "Hoggets" in Western Road was considered with no objection from the Council. The applicant is asked to arrange alternative parking for his cars during the construction period to help alleviate any further congestion on Western Road.

Mid Devon Council is compiling a list of historic buildings (pre 1948) which are at risk in terms of their condition. If you are aware of any that concern can you please let me or the Clerk know.

Next year is the Platinum (70) Jubilee of the Coronation of the Queen. Whilst the actual date is 6 February, national celebrations will be held over an extended special Bank Holiday weekend from 2-5 June 2022. This sounds like an excellent opportunity for the village to get together and have a truly memorable few days of celebration. This will need ideas and has to be organised, and volunteers are urgently sought. A notice has been up on the notice board but if you have any good ideas and haven't already volunteered please contact Sally Rowden or Hazel Wainwright, who have kindly offered to help get the ball rolling. Derek was often seen walking the country lanes here and in his home village of Colebrooke with his binoculars ready to view the countryside and wildlife. His funeral was held at Colebrooke church on Friday, 6 August. He was interred in the cemetery with his late wife Ann who died in 2017. CLIMATE EMERGENCY - SAVE OUR PLANET - RIVERS

I love living near rivers, but over the 36 years I've lived here there has been a decline in all the wildlife around the rivers. Shockingly, every river in England is polluted beyond legal limits. Figures from the Environment Agency released in September 2020 reveal that 0% of rivers, lakes and streams are classed as being "in good health". In 2016, 16% of waters were classed as good. The change represents more accurate measurements, rather than a change in underlying condition.

In July 2021, the film Rivercide was broadcast live: an investigative documentary, to find out who is polluting our rivers and why we are not stopping them. Nitrate levels in rivers, mostly from agricultural fertilisers and slurry, have risen in the last two years, polluting water and causing plants and algae to grow excessively, taking oxygen out of the water and killing off wildlife. In the last five years there has been a rise in the number of water pollution incidents, from fewer than 6,500 in 2015 to almost 7,600 in 2019; most are caused by water/sewage companies and farmers. Storm overflows are operating more frequently due to growth and climate change, putting more sewage into rivers than in the past. In 2019 storm overflows spilled an average of 35 times each and nearly one in ten spilled more than 100 times.

A major cause of this crisis is the collapse of environmental protection for our rivers. England's Environment Agency's environmental protection funding has been cut by 75% in the last decade. An Emergency Rescue Plan has been proposed - Government must:

- 1. Fine polluters per litre of pollution discharged,
- 2. Fund enforcers double the budgets for environment protection,
- 3. Monitor the mess install continuous pollution monitoring on key rivers, with live data displayed publicly online,
- 4. Buffer the banks make farm subsidies conditional on creating wild corridors along rivers and streams,
- 5. Let us test launch standardised water sampling protocol so local citizens can collect polluted water for legal actions.

What you can do:

- 1. Write to Your MP urging them to save our rivers,
- 2. Sign the petition at <u>riveractionuk.com</u>,
- 3. Join or start a 'Friends Group' organise clean-ups, highlight pollution incidents, start citizen science monitoring,
- 4. Campaign for Bathing Water Status thanks to campaigners in Ilkley, England has one river designated for swimming. France has 570!
- 5. Respect your river visit it, learn its history, take children to play by it, share photos & stories,

VILLAGE HALL NEWS



BEE REVIVAL

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Keep your garden sparkling through September with Advice from Bow Garden Centre

September is an ideal time to plant new shrubs and trees, or move existing ones. They will get off to a flying start for next spring, as they will have had all winter to settle in. We have an expanded range of shrubs and trees, so it's worth a visit!

- 1. Roses including climbing, rambling and standard should be pruned down to just above a 5-leaf shoot, once they've finished flowering. Prune flowering shrubs, and any dead or diseased growth. Give evergreen hedges a final trim to make sure they are in good shape for autumn.
- 2. Now is the time to use winter tree wash to remove insect debris, dust and wax which insects use to secure their eggs. Suitable for use on all plants, but particularly evergreens, it removes contaminants from the leaf surface to increase light exposure and encourage photosynthesis. Also use' Seal & Heal' to seal any tree wounds, and protect pruned branches against ingress of diseases and harmful pests such as coral spot and silver leaf. Use Greasebands & Moth Pheromone Traps on trees as a pest barrier for fruit trees these pesticide-free grease bands & traps are ideal for organic gardeners and effectively trap winter moths and other insects.
- 3. Refresh hanging baskets, pots and borders with colourful autumn bedding plants.
- 4. Repair any brown-looking grass and patches on your lawn now, using Patch Repair, grass seeds, and lawn feed, all available in-store. Scarify off heavy moss or thatch.
- 5. Keep your garden looking tidy by gathering up leaves from lawns and pathways now. Use a garden vacuum or rake and leaf collector to help make the job easier.
- 6. Rain is great for your flowers, but it encourages weeds too. Continue tackling weeds with weed killers (including some natural alternatives) or weeding tools such as Weed Slice or Weed Burners, designed to make the hard work of tackling weeds easier.
- 7. Now is the ideal time to be planting perennials, bulbs and seeds so that they flower in time for spring next year (save tulip bulbs for Oct/Nov planting). We have a wide range now in store, so you can choose your favourite display of colours, and beautiful fragrances.
- 8. Cover your pond using a pond net to protect it from leaves falling. Debris can result in algae and sludge which, if left for long enough, will reduce oxygen levels and harm your fish. Pond vacuums also help to maintain a clear healthy pond at this time of year.
- 9. Clear out your greenhouse and clean the glass to increase the amount of sunlight coming in. Also get to work on removing any pests and disinfect inside your greenhouse. Get bubble wrap ready for winter insulation in your greenhouse.
